Focus on mentoring

One of the benefits of M25 membership is our Mentoring Scheme. Whether you are a non-senior member of library staff looking to develop your career by having a mentor (being a mentee), or a librarian, manager or leader looking to mentor as part of your development and commitment to the profession, why not take a closer look at the M25 Mentoring Scheme? Both mentors and mentees will gain from the experience and this in turn will sustain a continuous learning cycle within the Consortium.

The M25 Mentoring Scheme is intended to support non-senior staff in the Consortium's member libraries in their professional growth by facilitating mentoring relationships with more experienced colleagues.

The scheme also aims to support the progression of LGBTQ+ and BAGM staff by giving mentees the opportunity to be matched with a mentor from a specific group or background.

The Consortium follows the general mentoring guidance provided by SCONUL for their leadership scheme. In their guidance SCONUL defines mentoring as "a professional relationship in which an experienced person (mentor) assists another person (mentee) in developing specific skills and knowledge that will enhance the mentee's professional and personal growth. It is an effective way of helping people to progress in their chosen career, and is a helpful relationship based upon trust and respect."

What's the difference between mentoring and coaching?

There are different definitions of both mentoring and coaching. Mentoring has more focus on professional development, whereas coaching may also encompass more personal and life-related issues. Typically, a mentor will be someone from a similar professional background but with more experience than the mentee. Mentors should have at least two years' experience at a level equivalent to or higher than their proposed mentee.

There's more to come and we're excited that this autumn we will be:



Deaf Awareness Training with Dot Sign Language

Online, Thursday 28th November 10.30am-1pm

This session looks at the prevalence of deafness in the U.K, deaf issues, deaf culture and British Sign Language (BSL). It provides practical steps to help delegates actively promote engagement with BSL users ensuring accessibility. Part of the training is a 'hands on' session in breakout rooms to give delegates the opportunity to learn basic fingerspelling and BSL relevant to their workplaces.

Dot's teachers are all Deaf BSL users. They are the best people to teach their language and answer questions from personal experience. They will teach the session in BSL so delegates can immerse themselves in sign language. They provide an interpreter to voiceover the session and interpret questions.
